HIGHLIGHTS OF 2019/20

Soon after the shutdown due to the pandemic, donors like you answered the call to help raise over \$55,000 to provide Student Emergency Bursaries. These funds support students who are in dire straits and have no access to financial avenues to help with expenses such as rent, medical care and other imminent expenses. MRU staff redirected parking fees to the fund as well as many everyday donors who gave generously in one of the most uncertain times to fully fund an endowment that supports students in desperate need.
